

II. Academic Affairs

1. Registration

- A. Regulations: Article 17 and 18 of School Regulations
- B. Departments: Students must pay tuition fees to Finance Team and do a course registration on the BUFS website for themselves. Academic Administration Service Team is in charge of registration—related jobs.
- C. Registration
 - 1) A registration process consists of the course registration and the payment of tuition fees.
 - 2) The course registration is required for students to register a certain amount of credits per semester, and registration is completed after students pay tuition fees during the designated period.(Note: Scholarship winners are also required to make a registration at General Affairs Team.)
- D. Procedure: Students are required to register during the designated period at the beginning of each semester. Students must pay tuition fees first, and then do a course registration.
- E. Penalty for non-Registration: Students can be withdrawn from enrollment if they don't meet the registration deadline

2. Course

- A. Regulations: Article 28 and 29 of School Regulations, Regulation of Operation of Course and Class
- B. Departments: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Course: The course of study consists of General Education Course, Major Course, and General Elective Course.
- D. Course Completion

1) General Education Course

- a) In total, students are required to earn 5 credits in Character Field(2 credits in Chapel, 2 credits in Self—Development, 1 credit in Social Service).
- b) Students are required to earn 6 credits of English competence and 8 credits of basic competence in Arche Basic General Education Course.
- c) Students are required to earn a total of 21 credits in the Arche General Education Field, in which each field in the course has 3 or more credits.
- d) Students are required to earn 3 credits in Pragma Course

2) Major Course

- a) Students taking a single major are required to earn at least 68 credits from subjects and 9 credits from convergence module in Major Course (Major Mandatory, Advanced Major Practice/Major Elective).
- b) Students must complete Job Community Courses(Career Search, Career Planning, Job Community I, II) per semester beginning in the second semester of the junior year

3) General Elective Course

- a) Subjects in General Elective Course are ones of other divisions and departments, except for all subjects in General Eduction Course and in Major Course students are enrolled
- b) General Elective Course consists of teachers' credential program, minors, double majors, self-designed double majors, interdisciplinary courses, convergence courses and elective subjects.
- E. Course Credits: A course with more than 15 hours of classes during a semester has a value of one credit.
- F. Credits for Graduation: With the completion of all required subjects, each candidate for bachelor's degree must earn a minimum of 130 credits from the General Education Course, Major Course, and General Elective Course.

3. Course Registration

- A. Regulations: Article 18 of School Regulation, Regulation of Course Registration, Regulation of Scholarship
- B. Departments: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Course Registration
 - 1) Students are allowed to register for up to 19 credits(at least one subject for seniors) and 17 credits are normally recommended. But, students who take cyber(virtual) courses are allowed to take 3 credits more than the maximum credits with the payment of additional tuition fees.
 - 2) Students who received an academic warning notice in the previous semester must register two credits less than the maximum credits they can register.
 - 3) Students who are selected for dual-degree courses in English spoken countries and majoring in Department of Paideia for Creative Leadership can earn a maximum of 27 credits, and students whose GPAs in the previous semester are 3.5 or higher and complete GLE can earn a maximum of 24 credits. Students are allowed to register for additional courses in the following cases:
 - ① Students whose GPAs in the previous semester are 4.0 or higher: +3 credits
 - ② R.O.T.C. cadet: +2 credits
 - ③ Students taking a Teacher's Credential Program with a double major: +3 credits
 - ④ Students taking an Interdisciplinary Bachelor's and Master's Degree: +3 credits
 - 4) Scholarships are not granted to students who register for less than 15 credits(9 credits for seniors) in each semester.
- D. Credit Carryover: Students who take fewer than 19 credits, the maximum credits students can take, in the previous semester are allowed to take additional credits within a maximum of 2 credits. But, a student who falls under any of the following cases shall be excluded:
 - ① BUFS students who are participating in exchange programs at domestic and other universities or colleges
 - 2 Students completing field placement
 - 3 Students receiving academic warning
 - 4 Students completing 8 or more semesters
 - ⑤ Students from other universities or colleges who take classes at BUFS
 - 6 Students who cancelled a subject

D. Notes

- 1) Students are not allowed to take overlapping subjects and cannot earn the credit from those subjects.
- 2) The code of subjects and the class number should be matched at the time of course registration. If not, students who take the subjects cannot claim credits.
- 3) Students whose names are not listed in the official attendance book must visit Academic Administration Service Team to verify their course registration.
- 4) Students cannot earn credits from any subject without course registration nor register for credits more than maximum credits.
- 5) When students choose subjects that they already registered for, this is considered as retaking the course and the earned credits are invalidated.
- 6) Seniors can register for courses of graduate school.
- E. Cancellation of Registration: Students can cancel a subject through one fourth of the class days of the semester with a proper procedure.

4. Attendance

- A. Regulations: Article 36 of School Regulation and Regulation of Examinations and Academic Assessment
- B. Departments: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Attendance, Tardiness

- 1) Being late for a class more than 10 minutes or leaving the classroom without the approval of a professor are deemed to be an absence from the class.
- 2) Early leave means leaving the classroom with the approval of a professor.
- 3) Three times of being late and early leave are counted as one absence.
- 4) Absence will be recognized as an official day off in the followings: when students participate in events as school representatives; are bereaved; are involved in a military service or medical reasons; get a job as a graduate—to—be; and their absence are permitted by BUFS.
- D. Attendance Assessment: Students are required to attend all classes in which they are registered. Students who are absent for more than one fourth of the total class hours of each subject will receive a failing grade(F) in the subject concerned.

5. Examinations and Academic Assessment

- A. Regulations: Article 9 of School Registrations, Regulation of Examinations and Academic Assessment
- B. Departments: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Type of Examinations
 - 1) Formal Examinations: A regular midterm and a final examination
 - 2) Other Examinations: Tests held at the discretion of professors of each subjects
 - 3) Supplementary Examinations: Tests for students who miss examinations due to illness, military service or other unavoidable circumstances. Students can take this examination within a week from the date of occurring those cases with documentary evidences.
 - 4) Special Examinations: A special test for recognizing achievement of the subjects concerned

D. Grading

- 1) Grade is the sum of evaluation of attendance, assignments, test scores, etc.
- 2) ① Except for very special circumstances, all students are graded on a relative scale.
 - ② Percentage by grade based on the relative scale is as follows: A or higher is 30% or less, $B \sim A^+$ 70% or less, $D \sim C^+$ 35% or less and F 10% or less.
- 3) Students who are absent for more than one fourth of the total class hours of each subject will receive a failing grade(F) in the subject concerned.
- E. Correction of Grades: After the period in which students can check their grades, grades cannot be corrected. Notwithstanding, with the approval of BUFS president, students can hand in the form of grade correction to Academic Administration Service Team to correct their grades.
- F. Examination Schedule
 - 1) Midterm Examination: April in the first semester, October in the second semester
 - 2) Final Examination: June in the first semester, December in the second semester
- G. Confirmation of GPA: Students can check their grades and GPA in early July for the first semester and in early January for the second semester at the on-line Integrated Information System.

6. Grade and GPA

- A. Regulations: Article 38 and 40 of School Regulations, Regulation of Examinations and Academic Assessment
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Grading
 - 1) In order to earn credits in a subject, students must receive at least passing grade, D or higher, or P. F or NP denotes a fail standing.
 - 2) Grading

D. Grade Point Average: ① GPA is being calculated in the following manner.

- ② The calculation result is rounded off to the nearest thousandth
- E. Grading for Students on academic Leave of Absence
 - 1) Student, who attend three—fourth or more of the total class hours of each semester and cannot take examinations because of illness, military service or other unavoidable circumstances, can earn credits through professors' evaluation on the existing test results, attendance, assignments, etc.
 - 2) Student who want to earn credits must submit the form of grade recognition.

- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Students who earn "C⁺ or lower" in a subject can retake the subject. The highest grade assigned in the subject attended for the second time shall be an A.(Students can apply for 'Retaking the Course' on—line.)
- D. Students can apply for retaking the course during the course registration of each semester. (Additional application form is not required.)
- E. Restrictions on Retaking Courses: Students can earn 6 credits, only up to 24 credits per semester in retaken courses (applied from class of 2019)

8. Academic Warning

- A. Regulations: Article 44 of School Regulations, Regulation of Examinations and Academic Assessment
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Students whose GPA for a semester is lower than 1.50 will receive an academic warning notice.
- D. Limitation of Course Registration: Students who receive an academic warning notice in the previous semester must take two credits less than the maximum credits in the next semester.

9. Summer or Winter Session

- A. Regulations: Article 5 of School Regulations, Regulation of Summer or Winter Session
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Students who want to have an early graduation and/or take minors, double majors, etc. can earn extra credits during summer or winter session.
- D. Students including those on academic leave of absence who are going to return to school next semester as well as exchange students can take this session. The maximum credits should be within six.
- E. Others: Students can enter summer or winter session at other universities or colleges with the approval from Academic Administration Service Team.

10. Double Major/Self-Designed Double Major

- A. Regulations: Article 32 and 32-10 of School Regulations, Regulation of Minors(Double Major). Interdisciplinary Major. Human Convergence Major. Self-Designed Double Major
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Students who wish to earn degrees in more than one department may apply for the double major program. Self-designed double majors allow students to design their own courses and complete them.
- D. Students can apply for minors, double majors, interdisciplinary majors or self-designed double majors from the beginning of sophomore year. Students can apply for or change these programs at the BUFS web-page from the first semester of sophomore year to the second semester of junior year. Notwithstanding, students who are selected for dual-degree courses in English spoken countries can take the course for a minor or a double major at Department of Paideia for Creative Leadership from the beginning of the first semester in freshmen year.
- E. All divisions (departments) are open to programs for minors and double majors.
- F. To earn a double major degree, students must complete the required courses and earn at least 33 credits for each major. (36 credits for students who entered BUFS before 2016)

G. Others

- 1) Without completion of their primary major, students cannot earn the degree of a minor, a double major, an interdisciplinary major, or a self-designed double major regardless of completing those programs.
- 2) When students taking double major course fail to meet the required credits, the earned credits are changed into those for minors or general elective courses.
- 3) When students fail to complete double major, they must earn the minimum credits for their primary major.

11. Minor

- A. Regulations: Article 31 of School Regulations, Regulation of Minors(Double Major) · Interdisciplinary Major · Human Convergence Major. Self-Designed Double Major
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. A minor program aims to broaden students' academic perspective related to their primary major.
- D. Students can apply for or change this course at the BUFS web-page during the designated period from the first semester of sophomore year.
- E. Except for Department of Paideia for Creative Leadership, all divisions (departments) are open to minor programs and there's no quota of attendance. But, the Division of International Studies is open only to foreign students.
- F. To earn a minor degree, students must complete the required courses and earn at least 18 credits for each minor.(21 credits for students who entered BUFS before 2016.)
- G. Others: When students taking minor programs fail to gain the required credits, the earned credits are changed into those for general elective courses.

12. Interdisciplinary Major

- A. Regulations: Article 32-2 of School Regulations, Regulation of Minors(Double Major) · Interdisciplinary Major · Human Convergence Major. Self-Designed Double Major
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. An interdisciplinary Major is a combination of two divisions (departments) or majors to offer a new course or major.

- D. Students completing 2 or more semesters can apply for or change this course at the BUFS web-page during the designated period from the first semester of sophomore year.
- E. All divisions (departments) are open to interdisciplinary courses and there's no limitation on the maximum of attendance.
- F. To earn an interdisciplinary course degree, students must complete the required courses, earn at least 33 credits for dual majors and 18 credits for minors (at least 36 credits for dual majors and 21 credits for minors for students who entered BUFS before 2016), and then pass a graduation examination. When students have already completed any subjects which are part of interdisciplinary major, they can be deemed to take the subjects of the interdisciplinary major.

G. Others

- 1) When students give up completing interdisciplinary courses and apply for minors, they could get a minor degree through a reviewing process.
- 2) When students taking interdisciplinary courses fail to take the required credits, the earned credits are changed into those for general elective courses.

13. Credit Exchange and Transfer

- A. Regulations: Article 46 of School Regulations, Regulation of Credit Exchange and Transfer
- B. International Exchange Team is responsible for international program, and Academic Administration Service Team for domestic exchange.
- C. Exchange credit and transfer program has been developed for students who want to earn credits in BUFS's partner universities home and abroad. It contains exchanges of both domestic and international universities and foreign students, studying abroad, and training (including summer /winter session).
- D. Students who want to join this program should apply for at least two months before the beginning of the semester in which they want to begin.
- E. Application Requirements

1) Domestic Program

- a) Registered a minimum of one semester in BUFS
- b) Have obtained a GPA of at least 2.7 or higher(Summer/winter session is not included.)
- c) Have no disciplinary records against School Regulations

2) Overseas Program

- a) Registered a minimum of two semesters in BUFS
- b) Have obtained a GPA of at least 2.5 or higher
- c) Are able to take classes in local languages or English
- d) Have no disciplinary records against School Regulations
- e) Must have no reasons of disqualification for travelling abroad
- 3) Students, who have been approved from BUFS, can join a short-term training during vacation or summer /winter session of other universities.

F. Application Procedure

- 1) Students who want to join this program fill out the application form and submit the document to departments concerned with the approval of head of divisions(departments) and academic dean. Academic Administration Service Team is in charge of domestic programs and International Exchange Team is responsible for overseas programs. The form is available at Academic Administration Service Center.
- 2) Applicants for overseas programs should take a scholastic ability test.

G. Learning Period

- 1) The period for exchange programs or studying abroad is run on a semester-basis and the total period cannot exceed a maximum of one year during the required period of study at BUFS.
- 2) A short-term training during vacations or summer/winter session of other universities is run in such periods.

H. Credit Transfer

- 1) Credits from domestic programs will be transferred up to 17 credits per semester, Semester Abroad Program(SAP) and overseas long—term programs up to 18 credits.
- 2) Students can earn within 6 credits per training course during summer/winter vacation and the maximum accredited credits must be 12.
- 3) Credits that students earned at other universities during their academic leave of absence can be transferred a maximum of 6 credits after returning to BUFS. In this case, it is the credits that students earned during the previous semester before returning to BUFS that can be only transferred.
- I. Registration: Students must duly maintain their registration at BUFS while they are participating in exchange programs both domestic and international universities, studying abroad, and training. The tuition fees for summer/winter session at other universities should be paid to those universities opening the session.
- J. Others: Credits that students earned at other universities during their academic leave of absence can be transferred but the period does not affect the required period of study at BUFS.

- A. Regulations: Regulation of Overseas Long-term Study Program
- B. Department: International Exchange Team
- C. Requirements
 - Students who complete 2 or more semesters and have one or more semesters remaining before graduation, as of the date of starting the Program
 - Students who can take all courses offered in local languages
 - Students without disciplinary records against School Regulations and reasons of disqualification for travelling abroad
- D. Selection: Document Screening(First Stage) → Interview(Second Stage) → Announcement of Successful Candidates

16. Semester Abroad Program(SAP)

- A. Regulations: Regulation of Overseas Long-term Study Program
- B. Department: International Exchange Team
- C. Requirements
 - Students completing 1 semester or more
 - Students with passion for learning and potential of growth
 - Students with integrity and a great spirit of volunteering
 - Students without disciplinary records against School Regulations and reasons of disqualification for travelling abroad
- D. Selection: Admission Fair(scheduled in April and October) → Document Screening → Interview → Announcement of Successful Candidates → Orientation

17. Academic Leave of Absence

- A. Regulations: Article 22 of School Regulations, Regulation of School Register Change
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. General Leave of Absence
 - 1) General leave of absence is for students who cannot take one fourth or more of the total class hours of each semester due to family matters, illness, or other unavoidable circumstances. Students who have completed one semester or more at BUFS are eligible to take this leave of absence. However, the preceding provision may not apply to a leave of absence due to illness or military service.
 - 2) In case students do not register for courses, they can apply a leave of absence during summ-er/winter vacation. While they do, they can do it on the day when reasons occur. Students

- who have taken three fourth or more of the total class hours of each semester are ineligible to take a leave of absence.
- 3) Students must complete the leave of absence form. When a leave is due to illness, a medical certificate should accompany with the application.
- 4) Length of Leave: Two semesters at a time
- 5) Number of Leave: The number of times students can take a leave is limited to three. Provided that a reason is acceptable, students may request one—time extension with the approval of the BUFS president.
- 6) Extension of Period: When students on a general leave of absence are supposed to join the military service, they should complete a form for an extension along with a copy of enlistment notice.

D. Leave of Absence for Start-ups

- 1) Leave of absence for start-ups is for students who pass a screening for start-ups. For this screening, students must submit documents issued from Entrepreneurship Education Center.
- 2) In case students do not register for courses, they can apply a leave of absence during summer/winter vacation. While they do, they can do it on the day when reasons occur. Students who have taken three fourth or more of the total class hours of each semester are ineligible to take a leave of absence.
- 3) Required Forms: Leave of absence request form, business license, and a copy of business project plan
- 4) Length of Leave: Four semesters at a time
- 5) Number of Leave: One-time
- E. Leave of Absence for Pregnancy, Childbirth, and Parenting
 - 1) Leave of absence for pregnancy, childbirth, and parenting(one's own children under the age of 8) is for students who are unable to continue their studies due to Pregnancy, Childbirth, or Parenting.
 - 2) In case students do not register for courses, they can apply for a leave of absence during summer/ winter vacation. While they do, they can do it as early as on the day when reason(s) to take the leave arises. Students who have taken three fourth or more of the total class hours of each semester are ineligible to take a leave of absence.
 - 3) Required Forms: Certificate of Family Relationship
 - 4) Length of Leave
 - Leave of absence for pregnancy, childbirth: up to 1 year(2 semesters).
 - Leave of absence for parenting: total 1 year(2 semesters).
 - 5) Number of Leave allowed: One-time

18. Returning to School

- A. Regulations: Article 25 of School Regulations, Regulation of School Register Change
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Returning to School
 - 1) Students whose term of general leave(two semesters) expires can apply for returning to school
 - 2) An application should be done during a registration period.
 - 3) Application Method: On-line application at the BUFS web-page
 - 4) Tuition fees of students on leave of absence are as follows.
 - ① Students leaving within 1/4 of a semester: Tuition fees paid will substitute for tuition fees of the returning semester.
 - ② Students leaving after 1/4 and within 1/3 of a semester: 2/3 of tuition fees.
 - 3 Students leaving after 1/3 and within 1/2 of a semester 1/2 of tuition fees.
 - ④ Students leaving after 1/2 of a semester: Tuition fees paid will not be returned.

19. Early Graduation

- A. Regulations: Article 42, 49 and 50 of School Regulations, Regulation of Early Graduation
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Each candidate for an early graduation is required to meet the following conditions:
 - 1) Students completing 6 or more semesters and the required courses, and passing a graduation test
 - 2) Students submitting the form of early graduation
 - 3) Students earning a minimum credits prescribed by each course of general education and major, and meeting the total credits for graduation
 - 4) Students who started school since 2007 have a GPA of 4.3 or higher, students who started school in 2006 a GPA of 4.2 or higher, and students who started school before 2005 a GPA of 4.0 or higher.
 - 5) Transfer students cannot graduate early.
- D. Students who apply for an early graduation should submit the application form within the designated period during the semester in which they want to graduate.
- E. Students who complete 5 or 6 semesters and whose GPAs fall into the following categories can apply for an early graduation:
 - 1) Students who started school since 2007: a GPA 4.3 or higher
 - 2) Students who started school in 2006: a GPA 4.2 or higher
 - 3) Students who started school before 2005: a GPA 4.0 or higher

F. Procedure:

- 1) On-line application at the BUFS web-page
- 2) Students who applied for an early graduation but failed to get permission must register for the next semester.
- 3) The results can be checked at Department Offices at the early of February and August.

20. Graduation Examination

- A. Regulations: Article 47 and 48 of School Regulations, Regulation of Early Graduation
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Each candidate for the graduation examination is required to meet the followings:
 - 1) Student earning 98 credits or more
 - 2) Students, who have completed double majors, interdisciplinary courses, training course for experts of international commercial relations and foreign language expert, follow the examination method of each major(course).

D. Types:

- 1) English proficiency test for graduation,
- 2) Graduation examination or graduation thesis or report of experiment and practice or performance presentation
- E. Evaluation Method: The detail of evaluation method is determined by each division (department).

21. Social Service

A. Regulations: Regulation of Social Contribution Center, Detailed Regulations of Credit Approval of

B. Department: Social Contribution Center

C. Credit System

- 1) The Social service subject is included in General Elective Course in which all students can take regardless of their grades or departments.
- 2) Students who have completed Basic Education(2 hours), Social Service Practice(26 hours or more), and Advanced Education(2 hours) all together will earn one credit.(Glocal service learning, sharing and vision, and global tutoring are excluded.)
- 3) Students who started school from 2016 must complete one credit or more of social service subject.

D. Operation

- 1) Social Service(General) 1-8:1 credit in General Elective Course is given to students who completed 2 hours' Basic Education, 2 hours' Advanced Education, and at least 26 hours of Social Service Practice from their enrollment to the enrolled semester and submitted a Request for Grade Recognition.
- 2) Social Service(Tandem) 1-2:1 credit in General Elective Course is given to international students or foreign and Korean students who completed 2 hours' Basic Education, 2 hours' Advanced Education, and at least 26 hours of Social Service Practice from their enrollment to the enrolled semester and submitted a Request for Grade Recognition.
- 3) Social Service(Overseas) 1:1 credit in General Elective Course is given to students who completed 2 hours' Basic Education, 2 hours' Advanced Education, and at least 26 hours of Overseas Social Service Practice during their required period of study and submitted a Request for Grade Recognition.
- 4) Social Service(Overseas) 2:1 credit in General Elective Course is given to students who completed 2 hours' Basic Education, 2 hours' Advanced Education, and at least 46 hours of Overseas Social Service Practice during their required period of study and submitted a Request for Grade Recognition.
- 5) Social Service(Glocal Service Learning)(course title + professors concerned):
 Subjects-connected service program. Students who take sub-classes and have a form signed by professors concerned can get one credit in General Elective Course.
- 6) Social Service(Glocal Service Learning)(9, 10): Subjects—connected service program. Students who take sub—classes and have a form signed by professors concerned can get one credit in General Elective Course.
- 7) Social Service(Sharing and Vision) 1: One credit in General Elective Course is given to students who have taken the program of sharing and vision organized by Center for Teaching and Learning (CTL) and completed Social Service Practice of 8 hours or more.
- 8) Social Service(Sharing and Vision) 2: One credit in General Elective Course is given to students who have taken this course after completing Social Service(Sharing and Vision) 1.
- 9) Social Service(Global Tutoring) 1: Two credits in General Elective Course is given to students who have taken the global tutoring program organized by CTL.
- 10) Social Service(Global Tutoring) 2: Two credits in General Elective Course is given to students who have taken this course after completing Social Service(Global Tutoring) 1.

E. Grading

- 1) Students will receive a grade of P or NP for their performance.
- 2) Students who fall into one the following categories may receive NP.
 - a) Being absent from Basic Education(2 hours) at each semester
 - b) Having less than 26 hours of attendance in Practice
 - c) Not registering a Certificate of Social Service online NOMAD Human Resource System
 - d) Not submitting a Request for Grade Recognition
 - e) Being absent from Advanced Education(2 hours) after Social Service Practice

F. Standard of Social Service

- 1) Service programs organized by BUFS Social Contribution Center or service activities for institutions or organizations that are accepted by BUFS Social Contribution Center
- 2) Service activities organized by BUFS colleges, divisions (departments), administration

departments

- 3) Service activities for local welfare centers or non-profit social welfare organizations
- 4) Assistance in administration or supporting activities in organizations related to majors
- 5) Service activities for organizations for the underprivileged
- 6) Service activities for organizations that are officially recognized
- 7) Service activities that are acknowledged by BUFS president
- 8) Notwithstanding the previous paragraphs, part—time jobs in those organizations and/or institutions are not accepted.

G. BUFS Global Volunteers' Group

"BUFS Global Volunteers' Group", an affiliated organization of Social Contribution Center, consists of faculty, school staff members and students. Its main function is to support Social Contribution Center's activities.

H. 'Elective' Program

Individuals, clubs or the student council can initiate service programs that include detailed plans such as work, place, and schedule. With the approval of BUFS Volunteers' Group, they can do the activities and earn service hours.

I. Blood Donation

A blood donation(whole blood, components) is counted as 4 service hours.

J. Scholarship and Privilege

- 1) **Certificate of Social Service**: Students attending these programs can receive a certificate, which will be helpful for their employment.
- 2) **Scholarship**: Successful candidates for overseas service activities will be offered a certain scholarship.
- 3) Social Service Mileage Scholarship: The mileage scholarship is given to students who participate in volunteer activities organized by BUFS or accumulate a lot of volunteer hours; students who are recommended by the head of the volunteer organizations in which students participate in volunteer activities organized by BUFS; students who volunteer at the rehabilitation-related, the senior-related, or the child-related institution.

22. Change of Divisions(Departments)

- A. Regulations: Article 19 of School Regulations, Regulation of Change of Divisions(Departments)
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Definition: Change of divisions (departments) refers to the change of majors from one college to another college at BUFS.
- D. Application: Students who want to change their majors or divisions(departments) may apply within 30 days before the beginning of each semester in the sophomore or the beginning of their junior years. The request for a change of divisions(departments) is limited to one—time only.
- E. Requirements: Students who have already earned required credits for completion and whose GPA is 2.0 or higher.
- F. Change of Divisions(Departments): all divisions(departments)
- G. Limitation of Change: Students who are admitted by special talents and transfer admission are not allowed to apply change of divisions (departments).
- H. Quota: The number of moving—in students is limited within 30% of annual entrance quota by divisions (departments). The moving—out is allowed within 20% of annual entrance quota by divisions(departments).
- I. Completion of Course: Students who change their divisions (departments) shall complete the courses of new divisions (departments).

J. Credit Transfer

1) Already-earned credits in General Education Course(mandatory) and general education in

- fields will be transferred to move-in divisions(departments).
- 2) Already—earned credits which are identical or equivalent to general education, major mandatory, and major subjects of move—in divisions(departments) may be transferred with the request of head of the move—in divisions(departments).

23. Dis-enrollment and Withdrawal

- A. Regulations: Article 27 and 45 of School Regulations, Regulation of School Register Change
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Students who fall into one of the followings will be withdrawn from BUFS enrollment.
 - 1) Students who fail to register in time after a leave of absence
 - 2) Students who fail to meet the registration deadline each semester
 - 3) Students who cannot continue to study due to unavoidable circumstances such as illness
 - 4) Students who enter other schools
 - 5) Students who are withdrawn from BUFS according to the Article 61 of School Regulation
- D. Type of Dis-enrollment
 - 1) Students will be withdrawn from BUFS enrollment if they fail to pay tuition fees within the registration period.
 - 2) Students will be withdrawn from BUFS enrollment if they fail to register in time after a leave of absence.
 - 3) Students will be withdrawn from BUFS enrollment if they fail to do course registration during the designated period.
- E. Others: Students who want to withdraw from BUFS must submit a written request form.

24. Readmission

- A. Regulations: Article 11 of School Regulations, Regulation of Readmission
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Students who had been withdrawn from BUFS enrollment or left BUFS by the School Regulation may apply for readmission.
- D. Students must apply for readmission during the designated period at the end of each semester. Readmission is only allowed to their original divisions(departments).
- E. Quota: BUFS may grant permission to qualified students if vacancies are created in the given divisions (departments).
- F. Application: Students can apply for readmission on-line.
- G. Readmission Period: Students can be readmitted to BUFS within 30 days of the beginning of each semester.
- H. Others: Divisions(departments) without vacancies will not have readmitted students.

25. Certificate Issuance

- A. Regulations: Regulation of Certificate Issuance
- B. Department: Academic Administration Service Team
- C. Types of Certificates Available

- 1) Attendance Certificate: For students who are currently enrolled and attending BUFS
- 2) **Certification of expectant graduation**: For students who enrolled for 8 semesters or more and have one semester remaining, meeting the graduation requirements or being eligible for early graduation.
- 3) **Transcript**: For students who earn credits of one semester or more(Minimum of one semester required for issuance, the record including rankings can be issued at Academic Administration Service Team or be received via Postal Mail, if requested.)
- 4) Transcript by Semester: For students who earn credits of one semester or more
- 5) Certificate of Completion: For students who meet the Article of 42 of School Regulations
- 6) Enrollment Certificate: For students with enrollment history at BUFS
- 7) Certificate of Leave of Absence: For students who are currently taking a leave of absence
- 8) **School Record**: For students who want to certify studentship at BUFS(The Certificate may be issued at Academic Administration Service Team or be received via Postal Mail, if requested.)
- 9) **Certificate of Expectant Acquisition on Teaching License**: For students who have completed teacher training program and are scheduled to graduate
- 10) Certificate of Payment of Tuition: For students who pay tuition fee for one semester or more
- 11) **Certificate of Scholarshi**p: For students with official records of receiving scholarship(It may be issued at Academic Administration Service Team or be received via Postal Mail, if requested.)
- 12) **Certificate of Scholarship Non-Beneficiary**: To certify that the students do not or have not received scholarship(It may be issued by the Academic Administration Service Team or be received via Postal Mail, if requested.)
- 13) Course Registration Certificate: For students who register for courses at the given semester
- 14) Certificate of Acquisition on Teaching License: For students who had acquired the teaching license
- 15) **Transcript of Teacher's Credential Program**: For students who earned credits in the Teacher's Credential Program for more than one semester
- 16) Certificate of Postponement of Graduation: For students who postpone their graduation
- 17) Other Certificates or Confirmations
- D. Service Fees: 300 KRW for Korean, 600 KRW for English
- E. Certificates for graduation, prospective graduation, completion, enrollment, removal, attendance, leave of absence, academic record, academic record by semester, graduation delay, and confirmation of course registration can be issued in English.
- F. Certificates Request
 - 1) Certificate Issuing Machines on the 1st floor at the Main Office Building (Building F)
 - 2) Visit to Academic Administration Service Team on the 1st floor at the Main Office Building (Building F)
 - 3) Print on-line via http://pufs.certpia.com
 - 4) Request by Fax at the nearest community centers(the citizen-service window)
 - 5) Request and receive via Postal Mail(phone or email request is available)

26. Change of Address

- A. Students who have changed the personal information including address, name, date of birth, resident registration number may inform BUFS of the change.
- B. Application Period: Right after the change
- C. Procedure
 - 1) For the change of address and telephone number, students can change the information at

- "BUFS Homepage/Integrated Information System/Changing Personal Information." (Additional forms are not required.)
- 2) For the change of name and resident registration number, students shall inform Academic Administration Service Team of the change with an application form and a copy of resident registration(abstract).
- D. Please note that without reporting address change, students may not receive postal mails that include academic records(transcript), information on leave of absence and returning to school, tuition fee bill.

27. Support for Students with Disabilities

- A. Regulations: Regulation of Support Center for Students with Disabilities
- B. Department: Support Center for Students with Disabilities
- C. Administrative Assistance
 - 1) Assistance for Course Registration: Upon the disabled students' request, assistants, academic assistants or person in charge will help them register for courses
 - 2) Assistive Technology Services: To accommodate a better academic environment for handicapped students, the center provides various devices for their study and mobility.
 - 3) Administrative Services: Services of filling in and submitting various forms for students visually or mentally impaired

D. Support for Learning

- 1) By requesting assistance to the professors of the classes, students with disabilities can be provided an academic guidance.
- 2) Professors of the classes note the types of disabilities in the attendance book.
- 3) For the educational opportunity and academic potential of the students with disabilities, professors of the classes specify a syllabus, assignments, assessment, and the details of assistance.
- 4) The center offers assistants to students with disabilities with various services that include note—taking and writing for tests and reports, tutoring, other services for school life, mobility services like using wheelchairs, etc.
- 5) The center provides a syllabus for the students with disabilities at the request of students with disabilities.
- 6) Upon the handicapped students' requests, the center provides supplementary learning materials for the students with disabilities.
- 7) For students using wheelchairs, the classrooms can be changed to have an easy access.
- 8) Examinations(evaluations): Upon the handicapped students' requests, the center can offer writing service, replace the written tests or evaluations with oral ones, or provide test sheets with enlarged characters.
- 9) The students with disabilities have the priorities over the front seats in the classrooms.
- 10) The students with disabilities have the priorities over the seats where they can have an easy access to materials and equipment in the library.

E. Consultation Program

To help students with disabilities, the center offers various consultation programs as follows;

- 1) Life Guidance: School Life including health, families, relationships and personality
- 2) Career Guidance: Career development mainly including academic affairs like an academic leave of absence, returning to school, and change of department
- 3) Employment Guidance: The Center arranges for the students with disabilities to attend job fairs organized by BUFS or related organizations as well as offers counseling for employment and recommendation for employment.

F. Scholarships

1) Chamsarang Scholarship: Students who are severely handicapped(Disability rating 1, 2 or 3)

- will be exempt from the 2/3 of tuition fees, while mildly handicapped students(Disability rating 4,5 or 6) the 1/3 of tuition fees(GPA requirement: 1.88 or higher, no requirement of credits earned).
- 2) Students whose guardians are the disabled(Disability rating1, 2 or 3) or are within income quintile 7 will be exempt from the 1/3 of tuition fees(GPA requirement is 2.0 or higher.)
- 3) Scholarship for Student Helper: A certain amount of scholarship is provided for students who work for the students with disabilities by the request of the handicapped students.
- G. Credit of Social Service: Strequest of the handicapped students for a certain period of time can earn two credits in Social Service.

H. Benefits

- 1) Dormitory
- 2) Recommendation for Full-time or Part-time Jobs
- I. Students who have severe disabilities which make their studies more difficult can extend the required period of study and residence for another year.
- J. Support and Rental of Assistive Technology for Learning: Support Center for Students with Disabilities
 - Software and devices for learning: Notebooks, voice recorders, Zoom Text Xtra, and voice amplifiers
 - Equipment for mobility: Crutches
- K. Social Gatherings: To improve handicapped students' educational environment, social gatherings are regularly held.

C. Requirements

- 1) Students who earned 15 credits or more(9 credits for seniors, 10 credits for study-abroad students), obtained certain grades, and meet the requirements of each scholarship

- 3) Students who have no disciplinary records against School Regulations in the previous semester

D. Application of Scholarship

- 1) Students who want to apply for scholarship fill out the application form and submit the form to Student Affairs & Welfare Team during the designated period in June(1st semester) and December (2nd semester). This is not the case for students for academic scholarship.
- 2) Scholarship winners are selected after the process of qualification screening.
- 3) Tuition bills reduced by the amount of the scholarship are issued.

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A. What is social service?

The social service not only solves social issues but is greatly meaningful for the service workers. Interacting with the marginalized people makes participants understand the human dignity, help achieve self-realization, and have practical experience before graduations. Most of all, a little effort can make a change for a better society. Many companies stress social works and ask their employees to join such activities. Social service career has also become an advantage for employment.

Anyone can do this job. But, it is university students that the society greatly wants for detailed and specialized social work.


C. Social Service with BUFS

C. Dormitory Move-in

1) Student Dormitory

■ Requirements

- ① Any new, enrolled(including returning students) and graduate students who come from outside Busan; study hard and are well-mannered; and have no contagious diseases
- ② Any students who come under one of those followings are not allowed to move into the dormitory.
 - 1. Students who have gotten disciplinary action of more than limited suspension by the School Regulations
 - 2. Students who were previously evicted from the dormitory
 - 3. Students suffering from contagious diseases or carriers
 - 4. Students who are going to take a leave of absence during the given semester
 - 5. Student who is considered to be inappropriate to community life by the Supervisor
 - 6. Students who are re-entering into the dormitory with a penalty points of 8 and 13 or more in the previous year
- ③ In the event that the dormitory is not filled, students living inside Busan may be assigned rooms there.

■ Permission to move-in and term

- ① Permission to move—in is notified at the beginning of academic year. The term is one year (two semesters). When vacancies occur, the supervisor can select new residents to fill the openings in the order of backup candidates.
- ② Candidates must complete and submit an online application form during the designated period.
- ③ The date of move-in and move-out must follow the academic schedule. For students who start their residence life in the middle of the semester, the period will expire at the end of the term.

■ Guidelines for selecting residents

- ① Candidates submit an application form during the designated period on-line. The supervisor will select residents in accordance with the prescribed procedure and standards.
- 2 The guidelines to select residents are as follows:
 - 1. Students with superior grades(Entrance score for freshmen, grades in the previous semester for students and graduate students)

After paying a certain fee, residents must upload an identification photo online and complete the move—in registration, submitting an equipment checklist, a consent form and a medical certificate for tuberculosis examination within the designated period.

2) Dormitory(Female Students)

■ Requirements(Female students only)

- ① (Female students only) Any enrolled(including returning students) and graduate students who come from outside Busan; study hard and are well-mannered; and have no contagious diseases.
- ② Any students who come under one of the followings are not allowed to move into the dormitory.
 - 1. Students who have gotten disciplinary action of more than limited suspension by the School Regulations
 - 2. Students who have a record of expulsion from the dormitory
 - 3. Students suffering from contagious diseases or carriers
 - 4. Students who are going to take a leave of absence during the given semester
 - 5. Students who are considered to be inappropriate to community life by the Supervisor
 - 6. Students who are re-entering into the dormitory with a penalty points of 15 or more in the previous year
- ③ In the event that the dormitory is not filled, students living inside Busan may be assigned rooms there.

■ Permission to move—in and term

- ① Permission to move—in is notified at the beginning of academic year. The term is one year(two semesters). When vacancies occur, the supervisor can select new residents to fill the openings in the order of backup candidates.
- 2 Candidates must complete and submit an online application form during the designated period.
- ③ The date of move-in and move-out must follow the academic schedule. For students who start their residence life in the middle of the semester, the period will expire at the end of the term.

1. Career Service Center

The center provides job reference and placement services for students and(expectant) graduates, along with various data and information on employment. To help students advance into society, the center also organizes various activities such as publishing magazines for recruitment, holding seminars, special lectures, mock interviews, etc.

9. Student Counseling Center

Main Office Building(F Building) #515 ☎ 509-5213

The center is to help students seek self-development, handle personal conflicts properly, and prepare their future. It provides counseling of experts in psychology and individual and group counseling. The center conducts different types of psychological testing as well.

A. Student Life

1) Personal Counseling

Personal counseling is a program for students who are suffering from issues caused by inter-personal relationship, emotion, personality, relationships with the opposite sex, sex, career, study, adjustment to new environments, which are difficult for students to handle by themselves. It is kind of a process of self-realization in which students can think about themselves and find the answer for themselves with counselors. Counseling lasts about 50 minutes. The details of counseling are closely guarded. This program runs all the year round.

2) Group Counseling and Education

Group Counseling involves about 10 students meeting with trained counselors. Group members talk about a variety of issues by sharing information about themselves and providing feedbacks to others, while the counselors facilitate the process. Topics include improving self-esteem, enhancing communication skills and self-expression, art therapy, interpersonal relationship, public speaking anxiety, career searching, coping with stress, emotion control, etc.

3) Psychological testing is conducted to measure personality, character, aptitude, etc. Counselors will talk to students about their test results.

A. Chapel

As a general education course(required), Chapel covers the nature of life by educating the introduction of Christianity, building sound self—image and personality, and upright view of life and world, etc.

Students must complete Chapel I and II (one credit per semester), which contains various contents such as lectures, concerts, plays, movies, and dancing.

B. General Education Course for Christianity

There are two general education courses(elective) — "Introduction to the Bible" (2 credits) and "Understanding of Christianity" (2 credits). These classes serve as an opportunity for student to build basic grounding, have an understanding of religions including Christianity, and realize individual salvation and Christian sprit in society.

C. Services and Mission Activities

- 1. For services, there are services for Easter, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas, beginning and closing semesters, moving—in dormitory, and On—campus morning prayer meeting. There is also a revival service of beginning semester.
- 2. Other missionary activities are inviting guest speakers, retreats for the youth, support for clubs of Christian students, faculty, and school staff, missionary work for foreign students in collaboration with local churches, festivals for mission culture, etc.

D. Guide and Support Christian Student Club

I. Course Overview

1. Course Classification

- The course of the university is grouped into General Education Course, Major Course and General Elective Course.
- General Education Course is classified into Character Field, Arche Basic Field, Arche General Education Field and Pragma Field. Each field is subdivided into as follows: Character Field into Chapel, Self—Development, and Social Service; Arche Basic Field into English Competence and Basic Competence; Arche General Education Field into Literature and Art, History and Philosophy, Society and Culture, Science and Technology and Convergence; and Pragma Field into Foreign Languages, Health and Sports and Job and Practical Training.
- Students should take subjects of Humanities Fields in General Education Course as required by their colleges.
- Major Course is grouped into major mandatory, advanced major practice, job community and major elective.
- General Elective Course is grouped into Double Majors Course, Interdisciplinary Course, Convergence Course, Minor Course, Teacher's Credential Program and Elective Subject.


■ Educational Goal

Under the Dual Degree Program Agreement, the 2+2 Overseas Dual Degree Program allows students at BUFS, who enroll at both BUFS and the partner university for 2 years respectively and then meet the graduation requirements, to receive degrees from both universities.

(2) Features

- A. Full credits from BUFS and the partner university will be granted by both universities so that students can receive degrees from both universities.
- B. Exchange students to the partner universities will receive free tuition from the partner universities(exceptions for some countries).
- C. Exchange students to BUFS will receive scholarships when enrolled in the Overseas Dual Degree.
- D. Oe-Seong Track for Dual Degrees Program in English speaking countries allows BUFS students to register courses equivalent to the General Education Course of the American universities.
